

Interior Details



- 1813 Mercer sells 3 acres to Aaron Marsteller
- 1820 tax record \$350 building
- 1830 John Ish from Marsteller's widow
- 1846 Lafayette Swart
- 1857 sells separate lot to James Oden
- 1870 Hutchinson dry goods merchant
- 1895 Clarence Thomas inherits
- 1930 E.D. Howell "store house and dwelling house"
- Same family for 73 years
- Likely updated by Howell in 30's


- 1810-13 Mercer to Abraham Fulton - deed missing, one slave
- 1824 in debt. “Brick House” Auctioned to Horace Lockett
- 1831 John Ish. 1830 1 acre and log house to Ish.
- John Ish – 8 slaves
- Liquor License
- Ish ran a tavern. Likely out of the basement

- 1848 Ish was in debt. Auctioned “The TAVERN HOUSE” to Nathaniel Oden for son James.
- 1851-54 James Oden adds rear addition

- Nathaniel Oden dies of Typhoid in 1854. Glengyle
- \$72,000 estate including 37 slaves
- Widow Huldah moves into the Tavern
- 1860 census – Huldah owns 5 slaves and 1 slave house (1830 log dwelling?)

- 1870 Huldah with 3 granddaughters and two African Americans aged 20 and 8
- 1880 Huldah with 10 people. 4 grandchildren, one great grandchild, 1 African American servant and three boarders.
